Nepal Jesuits

Nepal

Since the devastating earthquakes of April and May this year, many Canadians have responded with wonderful “human kindness” to CJJ’s appeal for the work of the Nepal Jesuits. Today, the emergency relief effort has moved into a new rehabilitation phase. Support for rebuilding and re-equipping schools, as well as homes for some of the poorest people, is being provided along with social and medical services. To date, 43 schools and more than 4,700 students have been assisted.

Earthquake victims in Chhap, Nepal, are receiving rehabilitation assistance.

Syria

The Jesuit Refugee Service (JRS) is one of the few humanitarian agencies still working inside Syria. It also helps Syrian refugees in neighbouring Jordan, Lebanon and Turkey. CJJ has supported the work of JRS in this region since the beginning of the Syrian conflict in 2011. The emphasis of JRS teams is on “accompaniment,” a radical kind of peacemaking. It means being present to displaced Syrian families and helping them with their material, psychosocial and educational needs.
