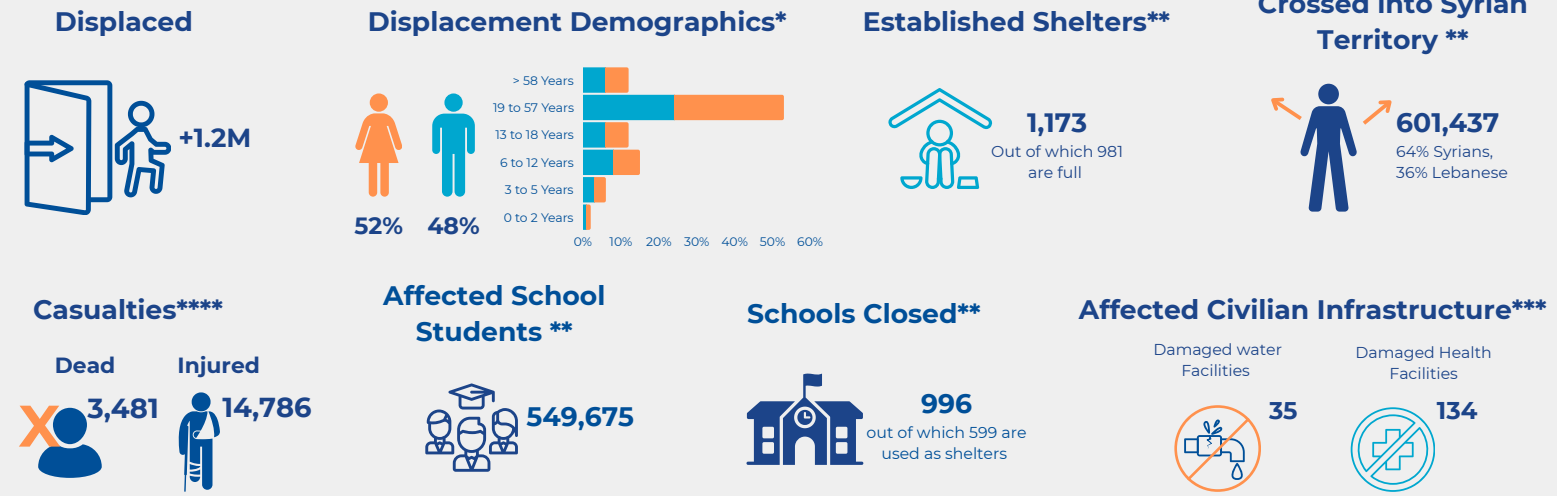

Interview with Nada Al Myr, Project Director

Addressing Urgent Needs in Baalbek-Hermel

“The major need in the collective shelters in Baalbek-Hermel is food and cleaning kits, alongside blankets and fuel for heating due to the cold weather,” says Nada Al Myr, Project Director for JRS Baalbek. Mental health support is also a pressing concern for displaced families. To meet these needs, Nada’s team distributed essential supplies both inside and outside shelters, ensuring widespread coverage. “We divided our team across Deir Al Ahmar, Beshwet, Barka, and Baalbek Hall to address the area’s diverse needs,” she explains.



Building Trust Through Fair and Transparent Action

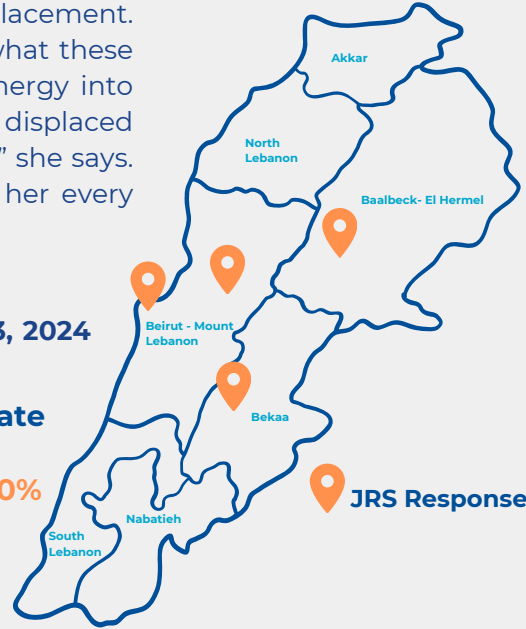
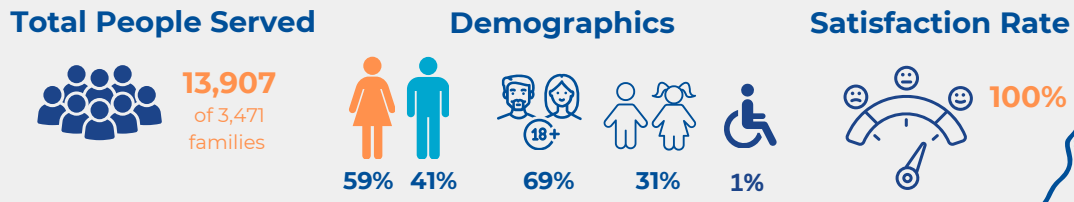
Nada emphasizes the strong trust JRS has established in the community. “Shelter coordinators saw how we assess needs and organize distributions. Now, when we say we’re from JRS, they trust us and are eager to collaborate,” she shares. Even when faced with challenges, such as a shelter declining hand-to-hand distribution, JRS maintained its principles of fairness and transparency, further reinforcing its credibility.

Turning Personal Adversity into Empathy

Nada’s work is deeply personal, shaped by her own experience of displacement. “Being forced to leave my home gave me a profound understanding of what these families face,” she reflects. Despite the challenges, she channelled her energy into supporting others, collaborating with local leaders to bring stability to displaced families. “This work isn’t just about providing aid; it’s about restoring hope,” she says. Her team’s resilience and the community’s strength continue to inspire her every day.

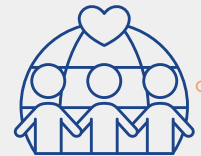
