An app that optimizes donations



The volunteers at the Collection Center of Colegio San Ignacio, tasked with centralizing the humanitarian aid of the Society of Jesus after the June 24 earthquakes in Venezuela, developed an innovative mobile application. Through the official website of the "Emergencia 2026" campaign, the platform features a public portal with "I Need Help" and "I Want to Donate" access points, allowing those affected to detail their needs through a form and enabling donors to find all the information necessary to collaborate.

On the other hand, the application's internal system (back office) manages inventory in real time and automates dispatch orders immediately. Thanks to a strategic alliance with the delivery service Yummy, supplies are distributed quickly and efficiently. Additionally, the tool guarantees full traceability from the origin to the destination of donations.

UCAB COLLECTION CENTER TOGETHER WITH CÁRITAS MOBILIZE TONS OF AID TO LA GUAIRA

During the period from June 26 to July 3, UCAB played a key operational role in emergency response in La Guaira, managing on Friday June 26 the departure of 2 trucks full of clothing, food, hydration supplies, and hygiene products.

Over the following days, this humanitarian aid and the institution's supplies were effectively transported and distributed at critical points in the region: the collection center at the Catia La Mar Passenger Terminal, the El Carmen Parish (Urb. La Soublette), the Pariata Parish, the Aviación sector of Maiquetía (Colegio Juan Pablo II), the María Auxiliadora Parish in Las Tunitas, and the Tanaguareñas Parish, for which 3 distribution points were coordinated on Saturday and 2 additional transfers were made in pick-up vehicles on Sunday, also serving to complete the load of 1 truck from UCV.

Beyond the physical delivery of supplies, UCAB's contribution added strategic value and human talent in structuring the operations of the alliance with the local Church.



Fe y Alegría focuses on the human side after the earthquake: "The priority is the person"

On the radio program "De Primera Mano" on Radio Fe y Alegría Noticias, the institution's director general, Jesuit José Gregorio Terán, emphatically stated that after the double earthquake of June 24, the absolute priority "is the person, the person, the person." Terán lamented that, beyond infrastructure, the most painful impact has been human, reporting the disappearance of students and staff from the movement, as well as multiple affected families who have lost everything or about whom there is still no information.

During the radio segment, the director detailed that the greatest damage is concentrated along the Caracas-La Guaira, Miranda, Aragua, and Carabobo axis, with preliminary counts of structural damage to beams and columns in at least eight educational centers in the Capital District and one in Carabobo. Faced with this reality and the collapse of basic services, he reiterated Fe y Alegría's commitment to activate all its organizational and communications capabilities to provide comprehensive support to the affected communities.

UCAB Emergency Brigade: 80 volunteers train Caracas communities after the earthquakes

With the premise that educating people to know how to act in disaster situations remains a priority, some 80 volunteers from the UCAB Emergency Brigade —made up of workers and professors from the institution— have been deployed to offer care and preventive support in Caracas. Since Saturday June 27, brigade members have been visiting sectors heavily impacted by the June 24 earthquakes, such as Caricuao, El Paraíso, Antimano, Altagracia, and Pinto Salinas, in order to provide key information and practical recommendations to the residents of these communities.

The members of this contingent have training certified by the university's Occupational Health and Safety Department (DSST) in fundamental areas such as first aid, fire control, hazardous materials handling, and evacuation protocols. Given the importance of multiplying these preventive efforts today, the DSST has extended an open invitation to all employees of the university community to join and train in the next brigade training cohort.

Five containers of international aid arrive at the CSI collection center

As part of the international "Emergencia 2026" campaign, the Collection Center at Colegio San Ignacio continues to establish itself as a strategic hub for receiving and distributing humanitarian assistance after the recent earthquakes. On July 7, a major solidarity shipment was received consisting of five containers from the Dominican Republic. This valuable contribution includes essential first-necessity supplies for the immediate care of the population, such as water, food, medical supplies, mattresses, and personal hygiene items, including diapers and toilet paper, as well as empty buckets to be used for critical debris removal work in the affected areas.

This international cooperation effort was also joined by the diplomatic support of the Embassy of the Netherlands, which made an effective donation of 15 packs of water with 24 units each to support hydration efforts.
